WORSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

The Stripping of the altar at the end of the Maundy Thursday worship service is symbolic of Jesus' humiliation at the hands of the soldiers during his trial before Pontius Pilot and at the cross. The altar remains bare until Easter morning.

The Eternal Candle is always lighted in the sanctuary. The candle is removed from the sanctuary at the end of the Good Friday service after the death of Jesus is read in the gospel story. The darkness is symbolic of Jesus Christ's three days in the tomb. The eternal candle is returned to the sanctuary after the Lord's Prayer is said in anticipation of the resurrection. For like God's love for us, the light is never entirely out.

MESSAGE FROM THE WORSHIP ENVIRONMENT TEAM

Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ. According to Christian history, Jesus was crucified on a Friday and rose three days later on Sunday. Back in 325AD, the "church council of Nicaea" decided that Easter should be made a true holiday. They also stated that it should be held on the first Sunday after the full moon, after the 21st of March, which is the Equinox. This means that Easter can land anywhere between the 22nd of March to the 25th of April.

This year, at Atonement, we celebrate Easter on April 20^{th} and will be enhancing our narthex and sanctuary with an array of Easter flowers. For each \$15, members will give flowers "in memory of" or "in honor" special people in their lives.



WHY IS THERE A CANOE IN THE NARTHEX?

Atonement owns multiple canoes that are 25 – 30 years old, and they have served Atonement well - providing a safe adventure for many adults and youth in the beautiful Boundary Waters. Unfortunately, the material the canoes are made of breaks down and becomes brittle over time. All of the canoes have had multiple repairs, there is an example now in the Narthex at church. This raises concerns for their continued durability and safe use.



Again, this summer Atonement pastors and youth are planning multiple Boundary Waters Canoe trips. Before they leave in late July, Atonement would like to purchase 4 new canoes that are large, durable, lightweight, and reliable. Then, everyone can feel safe, confident, and comfortable when

they hit the Boundary waters this summer.

Atonement can purchase discounted canoes, but they are costly, between \$2,700 - \$3,300 a piece. If you are willing to donate towards the replacement of the canoes, please, make your check out to Atonement Lutheran and in the memo line write BWCA Canoes. We appreciate whatever you can give. LETTER FROM YOUR PASTORS

Your pastors try hard to stay curious. It's easy to be curious about some things, especially things that are useful, or beautiful, or unfamiliar. Would that this were true of everything and everyone! Unfortunately, it can grow easy to give up on curiosity when things (and people) grow familiar, unappealing, or unhelpful.



Every sunrise is a gift, but how often do we wonder at and carefully ponder the countless pieces of God's work that give us a cascade of color and gentle warming each dawn? More to the point, how often do we turn off our brains while listening to someone repeat the same half-baked (so we think!) justification of their politics or diet or whatever for the 10th (100th) time?

Come to think of it, you might already be bored and incurious about a second pastors' letter about curiosity in the first 3 months of 2025. But if you've hung in reading this for the first 2 paragraphs, perhaps you're able to practice the imitation of Christ that writer Zadie Smith described in a long ago (pre-covid) interview in the *Toronto Star*:

"I think the hardest thing for anyone is accepting that other people are real as you are. That's it. Not using them as tools not using them as examples or things to make yourself feel better or things to get over or under...And it's so difficult that basically the only person that ever did it was Christ. The rest of us are very, very far behind." - The Toronto Star, Entertainment section interview of Zadie Smith by Deborah Dundas, pub. Nov. 8, 2019

Our national and local conversations are, as far as we can tell, getting harder and less productive. The fights we keep having just get more entrenched and predictable, and the consequences worse: we lose friends; we quit talking to neighbors; we cut off from family; people quit their churches over squabbles that are, frankly, nonsense.

If we are supposed to be about the business of sharing the Good News that Jesus defeated sin, death, and the devil, what is wrong with us that churches all over the world have regular and repeated blow-ups about furniture, printing overages, how strong to brew the coffee (or tea, depending on your locality), or because we prefer one party or politician to another? (Your pastors have a guess. It starts with the letter "S" and rhymes with "din").

All these arguments pale in comparison to the mission to which we have been called: to proclaim the salvation of the world accomplished by God in Jesus Christ. And to whom, you ask, are we called to proclaim? We are called to proclaim this good news to people who are just as lost and broken as we are, who are our sisters and brothers, and who hurt in all the ways we do. If only we could find it in ourselves to not only to speak, but also to listen.



Jesus gave a straight answer to only a handful of questions in the 4 versions of his life story that we regularly read. He asked more than 300 questions. Perhaps this tells us a little something about the value of curiosity? Yet, as Ms. Smith noted, Jesus is about the only person who can keep up that level of patience and interest.

So, we ask you to join us in thanking God for Jesus. And for his example. And we ask that you join us in praying for the Holy Spirit to rest heavy on all of us, like a finger on our lips, inviting us to hear and listen when our friend, our neighbor, our opponent, our enemy, repeats their tired old story or argument. We pray for the capacity to be curious enough about them to respond with a good-faith question, rather than fire back our same old retort. Perhaps that will lead to a true conversation, or maybe not. But, whether or not our curiosity bears fruit, we will have practiced the imitation of Christ, which is never an effort wasted.



April Mission of the Month: Habitat for Humanity



Central Minnesota Habitat for Humanity (CMHFH) works to build safe, decent, and affordable houses with and for lowincome families and individuals. Affordable homeownership helps to create stable home environments by lessening the

stress and fear that comes from unstable, unsecure, and unaffordable homes. It also allows families to save for the future and invest in more educational opportunities.

1 out of 4 Minnesota households pay too much for housing and are housing cost-burdened, paying 30% or more of their income for housing. (Minnesota Compass, 2021)

CMHFH was founded in 1989 in response to concerns about the lack of safe, decent, and affordable housing in the St. Cloud area. Construction began that same year on the first CMHFH Habitat home and, in 1990, that home was purchased by their first partner homebuyer. Since then, CMHFH has sold homes to 111 households in this service area. While CMHFH organization was founded in St. Cloud, they serve four counties—Stearns, Benton, Sherburne, and Wright.

MISSION AND YOUTH

The once-a-month Youth Packing Projects have been a huge success in educating the youth and participating adults about needs in our community. Financial support for these projects would be greatly appreciated.

We served 100 households; an excellent turn out for the first time. Clean-up and take down went smoothly.
