A NOTE FROM THE PASTORS

This month your pastors have chosen to share wisdom from a colleague who is the editor of the **Forum Letter** a publication of *The American Lutheran Publicity Bureau*. The American Lutheran Publicity Bureau (ALPB), established in 1914, is a non-profit organization independent of official church control, linked by faith and confession to the Church it serves. Committed to an understanding of the Lutheran tradition as evangelical and catholic, the ALPB affirms the Church's scriptural and confessional foundations to foster renewal within the Lutheran bodies of North America, Lutheran churches abroad, and the wider ecumenical community. The ALPB holds that all those under Christ who hold fast the Scriptures and Lutheran Confessions have a common life, with a distinctive role to play in conveying the Gospel message. In an era in which the Church in North America must address an increasingly post-Christian and secular culture, the ALPB makes the theological, liturgical and devotional resources of our confessional heritage accessible and relevant to all Lutherans as well as to friends in other communions. This article is shared with the full permission of its author.

"My Grandfather's Watch"

A few weeks ago, the Homeowner's Association where we live had its annual community garage sale. After our moving sale three years ago, we had sworn we would never do a "sale" thing again. But we have finally unpacked and settled in completely enough to know what things we really don't need anymore, so we signed up and set things out.

Early in the day, a man came by who was looking for gold jewelry. We didn't have much to offer, but I asked him if he was interested in a gold pocket watch. He said yes, so I went and found the watch. It belonged to my grandfather who died when I was thirteen. I used the watch all through high school and college, maybe even in seminary, but when I got out into the real world, I decided a gold pocket watch was a little quirky and I should probably just get a wristwatch like everyone else.

What's it worth?

The gold buyer examined it. "Well," he said, "it's just gold plated, so it really isn't worth much monetarily." He did make me an offer on a bunch of old coins, and I sold them. I was pretty sure there was nothing of extraordinary value, and while I might have gotten more had I gotten other bids, I knew I'd probably never actually do that, and I was tired of moving them around after sixty years of it. A bird in the hand, you know.

After he left, I didn't put the watch away. A couple of people looked at it with interest and asked how much I wanted. I picked a number out of the air, refused to barter on it, and most of them decided against it. Near the end of the day, a woman decided she wanted it, even at the price I quoted. She paid her money and walked off with the watch.

I immediately regretted having sold it. My face must have reflected my regret, as my wife put her hand on my shoulder. "That was hard, wasn't it?" I nodded. I lay awake that night, wishing I had not sold it. I didn't give a second thought to the coins, but selling the watch bothered me greatly.

Letting Go

In the weeks since, I've spent a lot of time wondering why I had so many regrets. The watch has been in a box for decades. Occasionally, I would come upon it, usually when looking for something else. In truth I knew nothing about the watch. I have no memories of my grandfather wearing it - indeed, I have very few memories of my grandfather at all, and I suspect most of what I think are memories in fact come from photographs. I've always fantasized that the watch was given to him at his retirement, but there was no inscription or other evidence of that. The only undeniably true story I can tell about it is that once, around 1971, I was mugged on a street corner in San Francisco, and the thieves took all my cash but missed the watch.

Had I not sold it, it would have sat in its box until my death. My children would have no idea about its history, and I doubt any of them, or any of my grandchildren, would want it. It would be just one more thing to put in the estate sale. There's no rational reason for such regret about selling it.

And yet, I do regret it. Perhaps it's for me emblematic of the ongoing challenge of letting go, a challenge that seems to confront one more and more often as one ages – God's way, I suppose, of leading us gently to that day when we will let go of this mortal life itself. It isn't always easy. I don't enjoy it.

Always Ash Wednesday

We've had to do it a lot in recent years. Leaving our home of nearly four decades was a challenge. We loved our community and our home. I finally was able to say, mostly with acceptance, "We've enjoyed this home for all these years, and now it is time for someone else to enjoy it."

Leaving behind hundreds and hundreds of books was hard. I still go looking for something and then think, "Oh, I don't have that one anymore." At least books are replaceable, though it never seems to be quite the same when you buy a new copy.

Letting go of physical strength is another kind of challenge. Every ache, every twitch, every memory slip, is a reminder of mortality. Almost every day becomes Ash Wednesday: "Remember that you are dust!" Some years ago, I heard about a phone app that would remind you, at random times, "Remember you are going to die." I don't really need that one anymore; my own body does the trick.

Saying goodbye

And, of course, as one ages, one increasingly must learn to let go of the people one has loved. A few days ago, we made a quick trip back to our old town for the funeral of one of our dearest friends in our previous parish. I reluctantly agreed to conduct the funeral; this was the only weekend our friend's family could all be there, and the current pastor was going to be on vacation, so he kindly invited me to do so. It was not an easy day – made harder by seeing so many dear people who have aged so much since we saw them last.

The next afternoon we stopped to see another very dear friend who is nearing the end. We had seen her in June and suspected then that we would not see her again. She went on hospice care not long after that. This time it was a good visit, but a very sad farewell.

"I'll see you on the other side," she said as we left – said, I must tell you, with a radiant smile. She died four days later. These are experiences that every pastor has, to be sure, but when you are no longer the pastor, when it is just your beloved friend whom you must let go, somehow it is a different dynamic.

A few days after letting go of my grandfather's watch, I happened upon a slip of scrap paper on which I had scribbled a quote from Epictetus, the Stoic philosopher: "Do not say of anything, 'I have lost it,' but rather 'I have given it back." I have no idea where or under what circumstances I jotted this down, but it resurfaced at the right moment. "Given it back." That's an idea that can be understood in a profoundly Christian way, is it not? All that we have belongs to God – home, family, daily work, all we need, life itself, all given to us by God. These things aren't ours to keep, but only to enjoy and then let go.

I would like to think that the woman who bought my grandfather's watch will cherish it, but I must let go even of that hope. It does not matter. I am learning, slowly and with resistance, that letting go is among the most profound lessons in this life. It is exceeded only by the knowledge, in the words of the Heidelburg Catechism, "that I am not my own, but belong, body and soul, in life and in death, to my faithful Savior Jesus Christ." And he will never let me go.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

At the beginning of 2024, our mortgage balance exceeded \$360,000. You have already pledged \$326,890 towards this campaign. Thank you for your faithfulness and generosity! And because many of you have already met your pledges in part or in full, our mortgage balance stood at \$181,136.93 as of October 15, 2024!

The church council and capital campaign committee plan to pay down the mortgage principal first, as quickly as gifts to the campaign allow. Once the mortgage is paid in full, all further gifts toward the capital campaign will be escrowed for the coming assessment from the City of St Cloud. We have not received an official estimate of this project's costs, but would like to be prepared for an assessment of \$250,000.

A REVIEW OF THE LUTHER CREST ANNUAL MEETING



On Saturday, October 12, 2024, four representatives from Atonement, Marcus and Marilyn Anderson and Talleiv and Karen Vollen, attended the Luther Crest Bible Camp's Annual Meeting. Also attending were Jana Johnson, a past Luther Crest board member, and Nancy Johnson, an interested Atonement member. The Annual Meeting was held in the Luther Crest Chapel on Lake Carlos in Alexandria, MN. Our collective

understanding is that Luther Crest Bible Camp is thriving and in the words of Pastor Maddie Elliott, Executive Director, her involvement early on as a young camper led to her belief that: "Camp leads to faith for life."

The following excerpts were taken from Luther Crest's annual report:

- There were 17 different programs offered, up from 9 programs last year.
- The programs benefited from having a partial seasonal staff to becoming a year-round staff.
- There was just under \$500,000 raised for the 2023-2024 Annual Fund drive.
- Luther Crest served 29 different congregations via day camps.
- The Green Lake Bible Camp was helped by Luther Crest supplying a short-term staff person to meet their needs.

Yet to come:

- The Christmas bake sale is returning!! The "pickup" dates are December 13 and 14. Stay tuned and check out the web site: www.luthercrest.org
- Camp registration for 2025 opens on November 1, 2024: www.luthercrest.org
- In 2025, Luther Crest will celebrate 80 years of ministry. The land for the camp was purchased for \$25,000 in 1945 by the Milaca-Glenwood-Fergus Falls Bible Camp Association. (Annual Report, page 11)

OF THE MONTH

November Mission of the Month: Catholic Charities Services for Homeless Youth (SHY)

This specialized program helps homeless youth build stability in their lives, as well as find and maintain affordable housing. SHY offers housing counseling and financial assistance for young people, ages 16 to 24, who are experiencing homelessness, near-homelessness, or aging-out of foster care. There is no cost to youth in the program and no referral needed. Many homeless youth find out about this program through their Street Outreach Worker who meets with them out in the community where they're at, which can be homeless shelters, drop-in centers, libraries, parks, etc.

This program provides:

Education Community resources
Referrals Basic needs

Supplies to youth who are homeless or are at risk of homelessness

Their Supportive Housing for Youth Program is a scattered site housing model that offers supportive housing services and independent living skills through one-to-one case management for up to 24 months. Youth learn independence as well as basic life skills. Youth are assisted in finding and maintaining permanent housing, finding employment, completing education, obtaining their vital documents, obtaining health insurance as well as connections to local resources.

Suzie Rice will share more information with us on November 10th at the adult ed session.

FOOD SHELF

The peanut butter supply is sufficient at this time. After Atonement worked there in September, we know can use jelly. For those of you who regularly volunteer, let Mission know if there is a particular need we can address.

Keep in mind when donating canned food, the pull tab opening works best. Many do not have can openers.

LINCOLN CENTER

Clean out your old jeans and hoodies. They can especially use sizes 34s and 36s. Clothing donations can be left in the donation center, but please bag and label them for Lincoln Center. High efficiency liquid soap is always needed as they do mountains of laundry daily and go through it quickly.

FROZEN MEALS AVAILABLE

Catholic Charities distributes frozen meals as part of their senior dining program from our parking lot from 1–2:30pm on the 4th Tuesday of every month. For eligibility requirements we encourage people to reach out to Catholic Charities at https://www.ccstcloud.org/ or call (320) 229-4584.

FACT: FEED AMERICAS KIDS TOGETHER!!

Another opportunity for us to feed our community kids! Tim Eck, a young man who grew up at Atonement has designed and built food collection boxes to be placed in churches in our community. SUNBEAM NEWS

On Monday, October 7th we were visited by Randy Finnikin, Chairman of the Sunbeam Board and Executive Director of the Spring Village Foundation. Since 1992, Atonement has had a 32-year relationship with Sunbeam. The last Atonement team was February 2020. Recently, Covid has prevented mission teams from going to Sunbeam.

The primary reason for Randy's visit was to meet with a group of former mission team members who have served the Spring Village Development Center which has been in existence for 27 years. It has been addressing the poor socioeconomic and sociocultural issues as well as providing post-secondary education to develop job skills. They have expanded their current offerings in hospitality, construction, automotive, agriculture, health, computing and driving. The Foundation also has programs in sports, performing arts, medical and dental support for the community. Their goal for the visit was to develop a new 25-year plan.

While Randy was here, he also addressed the current situation at Sunbeam Children's Home. They are committed to their original mandate to work with families who have challenges raising their boys and to work with entities committed to supporting boys. In the future, they will improve their production capabilities in poultry production, the piggery, the greenhouse, and the orchard and open field. They will use the facilities to train older boys to produce food for the market and the home. They will engage 7-10 boys in a Christ centered educational and character-building program.
